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Providing detailed information for all wildlife viewing programs





In 2024, we held focus groups with 32 disabled and neurodivergent wildlife viewers from across the United States and asked them about inclusive wildlife viewing programs. Overwhelmingly, they reported a lack of detailed information about programs kept them from participating. This is the information they need to know ahead of time for programs.
